Dear Curriculum Systems:

The College of Education supports the proposal submitted by the School of Music to terminate the Masters of Education in Music Education (MEd). Historically, many education programs from partner colleges at The University of Georgia used to be housed in the College of Education. This history was based on the educator preparation certification needs of students with specializations in areas such as Music. Over the years, content expertise is widely accepted as best taught in the respective disciplines from faculty who are located in departments outside of the College of Education such as agriculture, dance, music, family consumer science. Other partner programs at the university have absorbed their respective educator preparation degrees under the units in their home colleges. Music and one program in Art are the last of these programs to make the transition to their home colleges.

We understand that no students are enrolled in the generalist Master of Education in Music Education (MEd) as students have been encouraged to pursue the master's level preparation under the Masters of Music Education (MMEd) campusbased and online programs. This MMEd program is a much more tailored program in music education and meets the Georgia Professional Standards Commission for both initial certification and an advanced certification upgrade for teachers.

Further, in response to the required questions on the termination proposal paperwork, there is no need to notify students on the termination or completion of program requirements as no students are enrolled in the MEd. There is no impact on the personal and professional lives of faculty and staff as the students who would have enrolled in this program have transitioned to the MMEd program and faculty members have transitioned their work to the MMEd program. This termination will not impact other programs within the College of Education or School of Music as there are currently six students in the face-to-face College of Education version of the MMEd and 21 in the School of Music online version. Neither the College of Education nor the School of Music perceives any need to reactive or reinstate this proposed terminated program.

In sum, the School of Music has initiated this paperwork; however, the College of Education is fully in support of the proposed termination.
