1930's

Jack Larkin Austin, M.D. ('37). Dr. Austin's favorite class was Biology. He graduated from medical school in 1941 and practiced medicine for 37 years in Griffin, GA after his discharge from the Army in 1947.

Sophia Boyd Bamford, M.D. ('32 in botany). Dr. Bamford's favorite professors were Drs. John M. Reade and Julian Miller. The current event during her days at UGA were the Great Depression and Hitler's rise to power. Her favorite memories are going to informal dances at Memorial Hall with her brother, James E. Boyd, and his friends.

Fred Agnew Birchmore ('32 in English, '34 law). After graduation Mr. Birchmore practiced law and wrote two books. His favorite professor was Dr. R.E. Park, head of the English department. The favorite hang-out in his day was Costa's ice cream parlor on College Avenue.

Mell E. Booth ('39 in social studies and English) Mr. Booth's favorite professors were Dr. Coulter in History and Dr. Bocoock for Greek Mythology. Among his favorite hangouts were Costa's, the Varsity, and Atlantic Beer and Ale where he bought beer for \$.10 a bottle.

Nellie Bowen Campbell ('33 in math) Mrs. Campbell's favorite professor was Dr. Barrow in Math. She often went to Costa's for lunch where she could get a sandwich and drink for \$.15. Her favorite memory is riding the bus from campus to Ag Hill to go swimming.

Jane McIntosh Dearnley ('39 in English) Mrs. Dearnley's favorite class was Wagnerian Opera. Two of her favorite professors were Mr. Everett who taught English and Dr. Nuttycomb who taught human biology. A rule she thought that would surprise today's students is that students had to sign out before they left campus.

Honorable John James Flynt, Jr. ('36 in history and political science) After graduation Mr. Flynt practiced law and then served in the Georgia legislature and the United States Congress. The current event of his days at UGA was President Roosevelt's New Deal. His favorite hang-out while a student was the Varsity.

Harriet Wiseberg Greenblatt ('38 in fine arts) Mrs. Greenblatt's favorite professor was Lamar Dodd. She thought that the rule of having to sign in by 10 pm would surprise today's students. The current event that dominated the headlines while she was at UGA was the Great Depression.

Katherine McMillan Hendry, M.D. ('35 in Pre-Medicine) After finishing medical school, Dr. Hendry returned to Georgia where she practiced medicine until her retirement in

1979. She lived at Lucy Cobb her first year at UGA and then in the ΑΓΔ house on Prince Avenue. Costa's ice cream parlor was a favorite hang out in her day.

James Gibson Hull ('36 in chemistry and psychology) Mr. Hull's favorite professor was Dr. Jeter. The war in Europe dominated to headlines while he was at UGA. His favorite hang-out was the Varsity.

Margie Louise Kidd Jordan ('33 in history) Mrs. Jordan's favorite professor was Dr. Oscar Payne who taught History. The dominant current event during her time at UGA was the struggle to get out of the Great Depression. One of Mrs. Jordan's favorite memories is the 1929 football game between UGA and Yale University.

Frank J. Killingbeck ('34 in chemistry) After graduation Mr. Killingbeck taught for only a short time before he went on active duty in the Army. While at UGA, President Roosevelt's speeches about the recession dominated the headlines. Mr. Killingbeck's favorite memory is R.O.T.C.

Margaret Epting Medlock ('36 in fine arts) Mrs. Medlock's favorite professor was Mildred Ledford. Her favorite memories from UGA are the dances at the Physical Education building on the Ag campus.

Marvin M. Nathan, M.D. ('36 in chemistry) Dr. Nathan's favorite professor was Dr. Alfred W. Scott who was the dean of chemistry and was also his advisor and teacher of organic chemistry. Dr. Nathan's favorite memory from UGA is ringing the school bell after a football victory.

Sarah Payne Devereux ('39 in English) After graduation Mrs. Devereux taught school for over thirty years. Her favorite professor was her father, W.O. Payne. A rule she thought that would surprise today's students was the restricted dating for underclass women and the penalties of breaking that rule.

Esther Robert Pittman, ('37 in English) Mrs. Pittman's favorite classes were Greek and French. Two of her favorite professors were Dr. Babcock and Dr. Cumming. The current event that dominated the headlines was the New Deal. Her favorite hang-out spot was Costa's.

Elizabeth Powell, ('35 and '55 in English Literature) Mrs. Powell's favorite professors were J. W. A who taught Chaucer and Hugh Hodgson who taught Music. Her favorite memories are of the friends she had and of the faculty that she liked

Nancy Griggs Shipley, ('31 in political science) Mrs. Shipley's favorite professor was Dr. Payne who taught History. Her favorite hang-out spot was Costa's. Mrs. Shipley's favorite memory from UGA is the football.

Henry DeLeon Southerland, Jr. ('34 in civil engineering) Mr. Southerland's favorite professors we Dr. Charles Morton Stranghn and Dr. U. H. Davenport. The dominant

current event while he was at UGA was The Depression. His favorite memory is the Military Ball.

Samuel Zurick, ('34 in chemistry) After graduation Mr. Zurick went on to medical school. His favorite professor was Miss Zrigber who taught Social Studies. A dominant current event was the economy. His favorite hang-out was Costa's.

Lawrence K. Akers, ('49 and '50 in physics) Mr. Akers came to UGA after being a veteran of World War II. His favorite professor was L.L. Hendren. Mr. Akers comes back many times to visit Athens.

Ann Harris Dorell, ('48 in history) Mrs. Dorell thought curfew rules would surprise today's students. World War II was the dominant headline while she was at UGA. Mrs. Dorell's favorite hang-out spot was The Varsity. Her favorite memory is just enjoying the experience of being in college in Athens.

Frank Belyeu, ('42 in English) Mr. Belyeu's favorite professors were his English professors. The Varsity was his favorite place to go after classes. His favorite memory is life at the Lambda Chi Alpha house.

Laree Malone Benton Fred, ('49 in chemistry) After graduation Mrs. Fred taught and also worked in a hospital lab. While at UGA she lived in Mary Lyndon and the Kappa Alpha Theta house. The dominant current event was World War II.

Linton H. Bishop, M.D. ('47 in biology) Dr. Bishop went to Emory for medical school, where he actually graduated from medical school before he graduated from college. His favorite professor was Dr. Alfred Scoot who taught Chemistry. Dr. Bishop's favorite memory from UGA was learning how to think and speak on his own.

John G. H. Blake, ('42 in speech and drama) After graduation Mr. Blake went overseas during the war. His favorite professors were Miss Vanch and Mr. Crawe. Pearl Harbor was a dominant current event while he was at UGA.

Margaret Martin Burroughs, ('48 in English) After graduation Mrs. Burroughs taught high school English for over thirty four years. Mrs. Burroughs said a current event at UGA was the record enrollment due to the veterans returning on the GI bill. There were more than three guys to every girl. Her favorite memory is meeting Robert Frost and listening as he recited his poems in the chapel.

Elizabeth (Betty) Hodges Callahan, ('42 in liberal arts) Two of Mrs. Callahan's favorite professors were Dr. Payne and Hugh Hodgson. She thinks that a rule that would surprise today's students would be if girls were late for curfew, the house mothers would lock you

out of the sorority house. Her favorite memories are of the huge snowstorm of 1939 and when the football team went to the Rose Bowl.

Farrice Owens Callaway, ('48 in psychology) Mrs. Callaway has been married fifty-four years and has raised five children. She said the curfew and no co-ed dorms would surprise current students. Her favorite memories are of the band trips to the football games.

Sophia Stephens Camp, ('40 in history) After graduation Mrs. Camp taught school. Her favorite class at UGA was Latin. Two rules that she thinks would surprise students was the 10:30 curfew and sign-in requirements. Her favorite memory is living on Coordinate Campus her sophomore year.

Judge Santi L. Carnevali, ('40 bachelor of arts) After graduation Judge Carnevali attend Fordham University Law School. His favorite professor at UGA was Professor Kennedy who taught contracts. Judge Carnevali remembers UGA football All-American Frankie Sinkwich, Costa's and the Varsity.

Mary Effie Howell Coffee, ('44 in biology) Mrs. Coffee taught science and math in middle school after she left UGA. Her favorite professor was Dr. Nuttycomb. The dominating current event was World War II. Her favorite memory of UGA is the school dances.

Charles Edwin Collins, ('48 in political science and government) After graduation Mr. Collins worked as a tutor and was an analyst for political candidates. He has many favorite professors and a few are Dr. Saye, Dr. Byrd, and Mrs. McWhorter. His favorite memories are of the challenges of college academics.

Betty Smith Crawford, ('47 in psychology) Mrs. Crawford's favorite professors were Dr. Florence Young and her Political Science professor. She believes the rules on curfew and drinking would surprise most students. World War II was a daily current event. Her favorite memory of UGA was the overwhelming unity of the student body.

Sara Virginia Crane Crow, ('47 in history) Mrs. Crow has taught in elementary, middle and upper middle schools. Her favorite professor was her American History professor. To her there were several events that dominated the headlines: the Nazis, Chuck Yeager breaking the sound barrier, Jackie Robinson and the Marshall Plan. Ellen Williams Lovvorn ('45 in art) Mrs. Lovvorn used her major for a variety of things, including scouting, sewing, cooking and the Flower Society. Her favorite class and teacher was Annie Mae Holliday's watercolor course. Her favorite memories are of the dances and the football games.

A favorite place to meet was a room on the first floor of New College where students gathered between classes to play bridge. Mary Ann Gordon Martin ('49 in sociology) Mrs. Martin went on to Tulane University after graduation to receive her masters in Social Work. She then went to work as a child welfare consultant. She remembers the end of World War II and the return of the GI's to campus as a major event. Her favorite memory is of graduation.

Anita Fennell Marvin ('42 in English education) Mrs. Marvin used her degree from UGA to teach high school for 33 years. She lived in Mary Lyndon Hall. Her favorite memories from her days here are the early morning walks she made from her dorm through the woods, past the football field and to Dr. McWhorter's class.

S. Jean Bowers Matthews ('47 in psychology) While a student here, Mrs. Matthews lived at home on Dearing Street, near Dean Tate's house. Her favorite college memories are of attending the dances held on the weekends for the Navy cadets who were training on campus.

Lenna Mal Joiner Mayne McCranie ('49 in sociology, '68 MEd) Mrs. McCranie lived in married housing on Ag Hill when she was a student at UGA. Her favorite teacher was Dr. McMann and her favorite memories are of attending all the sporting contests or events.

Frances Freeman McLean ('41 in English) Ms. McLean lived in the Kappa Delta house while a student at UGA. Pearl Harbor and World War II dominated the headlines during her day. Her best memories are of the activities associated with the Baptist Student Union.

William H. McNiel ('40 in economics, '41 masters in public administration) Mr. McNiel lived in the Sigma Chi house where no alcohol was permitted. His favorite teachers were Dr. Robert Seacrest and Dr. Merritt Pound. He remembers Pan-Hellenic dances with big bands such as Tommy Dorsey, Jimmy Dorsey and Glen Miller.

Russell G. McRae ('48 in art) Mr. McRae used his degrees vocationally as a professor of art and as a professional artist. He lived in Candler Hall and Ag Hill. His favorite

memories are from his art, literature and French classes that were required for his MFA degree.

James Arthur Morgan ('44 in chemistry) Mr. Morgan used his major to teach high school and junior high school in Georgia and Florida. His favorite class and teacher was organic chemistry taught by chemistry department head, Dr. Alfred M. Scott.

Robert E. Morley ('48 in political science) Mr. Morley lived in the Chi Phi House and Enterprise while he attended UGA. His favorite teacher was Dr. Albert B. Saye. The Winecoff Hotel fire in Atlanta was a headline that stands out in his memory.

Margie Seymour Myrick ('48 in English) Mrs. Myrick was able to use her major in a career as a teacher for a year and then as a private secretary. Her favorite classes were in French and geography. She lived on Ag Hill and the Kappa Alpha Theta house. Her favorite memories are of KAΘ winning the sorority “sing” and dances with long dresses and live music.

Betty Decker Paris ('40 in English) Mrs. Paris used her degree for a career in teaching and writing. Her favorite classes and teachers were Dr. Payne in history and Edd Winfield Parks and William Wallace Davidson in English. Favorite eating establishments for her were The Varsity and Costa's.

Carolyn Baugh Reynolds Parker ('43 in drama) Mrs. Parker taught for a short time after graduation and feels her major gave her “a wonderful background to enjoy all the arts.” She remembers Moon Winn's as a favorite eating establishment.

Louise Woodruff Parker ('47 in history) Mrs. Parker used her degree to teach school. Because of the war, she was lived in an unused fraternity house on Milledge Ave. with 15 other girls. World War II and the death of President Roosevelt were headlines during her day.

Thomas N. Pirkle ('49 in chemistry) After graduation, Mr. Pirkle used his major for a career as a chemist then later attended medical school. Male students were not allowed in female dorms in 1949. His favorite memory is of graduation.

Valeria Dowling Plymale ('45 in psychology) Mrs. Plymale used her degree for a career in social work. She lived in Porter and Candler Halls where students had to sign-out when leaving the dorm for anything other than classes. Her favorite memories are of the time she shared with her roommates.

William Adams Pryor ('49 in physics) Mr. Pryor used his major extensively throughout his fifty year career; first as a health physicist and then as a nuclear physicist. He lived in the Pi Kappa Phi fraternity house and his favorite memories are of the big band dances and football games.

Cleo Parkam Reed ('42 in English) Mrs. Reed taught for thirty-three years after graduation. Her favorite class was Dr. Duncan's botany class and her favorite memory is of meeting her future husband.

Shirley Shulman Rich ('46 in sociology) After graduation Mrs. Rich received her teacher certification and a masters degree in library science from Georgia State. While at UGA, her favorite teacher was Dr. Fleming. Her favorite memories are of socializing with her Phi Beta Kappa sisters.

Conrad F. Routh ('48 in parasitology, '49 masters in parasitology) Mr. Routh used his degrees throughout his life. For 35 years he worked with the State Health Department Laboratory and for 2 ½ he worked for the U.S. Army. His favorite memory is of working on his master's thesis.

Elizabeth Bush Sellers ('42 in English) Mrs. Sellers used her degree for a teaching career. She lived on Ag Hill and in the Alpha Delta Pi house while a student here. Her favorite memories are of the time spent with her sorority sisters and of playing tennis with Lois Taylor.

William Desmond Stokes ('49 in chemistry, '52 Masters in chemistry) Mr. Stokes worked as a chemist after graduation. He remembers Herman Talmadge's gubernatorial race as a major headline while he was a student and his favorite memory is of graduation.

Frances Hug Sylvester ('41 in sociology) Mrs. Sylvester's major aided her in a job for the federal government after graduation. She lived in Lucy Cobb when it was a new dorm.

Barbara McCrary Taylor ('48 in art) After graduation, Mrs. Taylor used her major when working in the advertising department of Rich's in Atlanta. Her favorite memories are of meeting new friends and taking art classes.

Michael Greiner Toole ('48 in music, '76 MEd) Mr. Toole used his degree for a number of vocations: choirmaster, organist and school music teacher. While on campus he lived in Milledge Hall and the ATO house. His favorite memories are of going to dances.

Jane Cole Walker ('48 in history) Mrs. Walker's major provided her with the background to teach junior high school and a greater understanding of the world and its many challenges. She remembers the campus being very crowded with the return of soldiers after the war, but remembers it being a good time.

Anice Kilpatrick Ward ('45 in biology) After graduation, Mrs. Ward began to use her degree to train as a lab technician, but was married before she finished the course. While a student she lived in Lucy Cobb. Her memories are of dating the naval cadets who were stationed at UGA during the war.

Jane Waters ('42 in Spanish) Mrs. Waters became a school teacher after graduation. Her favorite professor was Hugh Hodgeson and her best memories are from attending basketball games.

Henry Dwight Williams ('49 in English) Mr. Williams lived in the Pi Kappa Alpha house and some of his fondest college memories are of campus and Dean Tate. His favorite teacher was Dr. Fisher.

Mildred Campbell Yates ('40 in music and English) Ms. Yates obtained her music degree just for pleasure, but used her English degree to teach for twenty-seven years. Her favorite memory is of being the only honorary female member of the UGA Glee Club.

Annette Lasky Yesner ('43 in sociology) Like many alumni, Mrs. Yesner remembers World War II as the biggest event that occurred during her college years. Her favorite memories are of the boys on campus.

1950s

Helene Ungar Adler ('50 in history, '52 masters in history) Mrs. Roler was a resident of Mary Lyndon Hall when it was a new dorm. Her favorite professor and good friend was Dr. E.M. Coulter. Headlines during her day were the wars in Korea and Indo China.

Henry J. Akins III ('53 in commercial art) After his military service, Mr. Akins was employed as an artist in various print houses and agencies. His favorite memories from his college years are of his position as art director of the Pandora and designing the marching band uniforms.

Jorge A. Alea ('54 in chemistry) Dr. Alea attended medical school after UGA. The Korean war and McCarthy hearings were headlines when he was a student. He has many good memories of his college days, including classes with Dr. Nuttycomb, good friends, sports events and the dances.

James Hicks Alexander ('53 in pre-med) Dr. Alexander attended the Medical College of Georgia in Augusta after his days at UGA. He enjoyed all of his classes here and lived in the Sigma Nu house on River Road. He still gets back to Athens to visit.

Jerry C. Allen ('58 in psychology, '60 masters in psychology, '68 educational psychology) Mr. Allen used his many degrees to become a school psychologist and a professor. His favorite memories are of the Lambda Chi Alpha parties and classes with Dr. Kathryn A. Blake.
